Today's readings are: 1 Samuel 1.20-end; Psalm 34.11-20; 2 Corinthians 1.3-7; Luke 2.33-35.

1 Samuel 1.20-end

In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, 'I have asked him of the LORD.'

The man Elkanah and all his household went up to offer to the LORD the yearly sacrifice, and to pay his vow. But Hannah did not go up, for she said to her husband, 'As soon as the child is weaned, I will bring him, that he may appear in the presence of the LORD, and remain there for ever; I will offer him as a nazirite for all time.' Her husband Elkanah said to her, 'Do what seems best to you, wait until you have weaned him; only—may the LORD establish his word.' So the woman remained and nursed her son, until she weaned him. When she had weaned him, she took him up with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine. She brought him to the house of the LORD at Shiloh; and the child was young. Then they slaughtered the bull, and they brought the child to Eli. And she said, 'Oh, my lord! As you live, my lord, I am the woman who was standing here in your presence,

praying to the LORD. For this child I prayed; and the LORD has granted me the petition that I made to him. Therefore I have lent him to the LORD; as long as he lives, he is given to the LORD.'

She left him there for the LORD.

Reflection by Rev'd Anne Strauss

“...he said to his mother, ‘Woman, here is your son’. Then he said to the disciple, ‘Here is your mother’”

John 19: 26-27

I was due to preach this Sunday. I fully intended to look through all the readings on Monday, to mull them over during the week. I was going to listen to how God spoke through them and through the people and places I visited. I was going to take time to look at what scholars have made of our readings. And then write a sermon to deliver in church.

But, of course, this week has been different. At St James's and in every other place in our parish and beyond we're having to put aside the way we usually do things, and learn new ways....fast!

There have been practical things to do. For example we've worked with the Queen Edith Community Forum and our sister parish of St John's to produce the 'Happy to Help leaflets' that may have already dropped through your letter box. A simple idea that can give us the courage to talk safely to our neighbours, and to find out what they need from us. But that can also encourage us to receive from help from them.

I've also been visiting our local shops in Wulfstan Way. Buying a bag of prawn crackers from the fish and chip shop, and some string from the shop next door to it. Having a coffee and cake outside at the Coffee House, getting my lunch from the Express Store next to the chemists, even though I usually bring lunch in from home. Finding out how things are going for them.

And I've been doing a lot of admin too: putting together our Parish Continuity Plan, requested by the Diocese for example. So I only looked at the readings for Mothering

Sunday the night before I started to write this. And I was so surprised to find that through them I felt God speaking so profoundly into my experiences this week.

The image of Hannah 'lending' her so longed for child, Samuel, to God. And then Paul's advice to the church in Corinth that God's consoling love is the force that empowers us to console each other. And of course Jesus's commending of his mother to the Beloved Disciple, and him to her. Passages that help me to see that God's intention is for love and care to spill out from the lives we live now and to permeate the whole of our world and all our relationships.

When I went to buy my sandwich at the Express Stores on Wednesday, I had a chat with the lovely man who runs the shop. He told me about what he's doing to try to help some of his older or more frail customers whilst others are emptying his shelves of toilet roll, pasta and flour.

'You see, I am a Sikh' he said, 'And for us, every woman is our mother or our daughter and every man our father or son. So I must help them.':
